The Passion of St Mark: <u>The Feast</u> The sermon is up on the spac.ca website Monday of each week.	We begin by focusing in on the Last Supper, the Passover feast that Jesus celebrates with His closest friends and disciples. The Passover meal, which had been the most important moment in the life and history of Israel, is reframed by Jesus, setting the table for the most important moment in history.

#### Engage

Scripture: Mark 14:12-26

#### **Optional Icebreaker Question**

1. When was the first time you took communion? Is there a story, feeling, or experience you had with this? For example: Did someone get upset that you took communion? Were you confused? Moved too? Etc.

#### Study

**Context:** Mark, considered a close companion of Peter, transcribed Peter's firsthand accounts of Jesus' life. Mark's Gospel can be read in two parts, the first (chapters 1-8) focusing on Jesus' identity as the long-awaited King, while the second half (chapters 9-16) explores the purpose of His death. Here in chapter 14, days before Jesus' crucifixion, Jesus and His disciples prepare for the Passover meal in Jerusalem. Passover commemorates God leading Israel into freedom from Egyptian slavery. The meal's elements symbolize the liberation (salvation) of Israel and represent four promises God has given to His people. During this Passover celebration, a presider or the head of the house will lead and explain the significance of all of this. Here, Jesus reframes the Passover, revealing Himself into the story, the promises God gave, and how the crucifixion will be the final Passover – the liberation – for all people.

#### Read Mark 14:12-26

1. What are your initial thoughts, curiosities, or questions about Mark's account of the Last Supper?

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2. How do you think the disciples felt as they prepared for the Passover meal with Jesus, considering the circumstances and tensions surrounding them (14:1-2 &10-11)?

3. Discuss and reflect on the symbolisms that parallel Jesus to the Passover Story. What sticks out to you? Why?

#### Read John 1:29; Isaiah 53:6-7; Colossians 1:13-14

- 4. What do you notice is 'missing' at the feast in Marks account of the last supper? Why? Comparing Mark 14:12 to v.22-24.
- 5. What significance does taking communion have on you? How have you taught others/family/kids/etc about this?

6. Reflect on this prayer by Jan Richardson, "And the Table Will be Wide." While reading/listening, consider where in your life or in your life group you're living out this posture of this prayer? Where might you or your group be able to grow?
